

Before I jump into all the incredible work that has happened over the past month here at the Métis National Council in supporting Métis Governments across the Homeland, I want to take the opportunity to express my sincerest gratitude to President Audrey Poitras for her 27 years of service to the Métis Nation of Alberta and Métis National Council as she announces her retirement. President Poitras has been such an inspiration to me and

has been such an incredible example of leadership and dedication to the Nation.

With the month of June being National Indigenous History month, there have been many reasons to celebrate, especially on the 21st which was National Indigenous Peoples Day.

Earlier this month the Royal Canadian Mint unveiled a new \$2 commemorative circulation coin honouring First Nations, Métis, and Inuit histories and heritages. This coin was designed in collaboration with 3 artists, one of whom being Métis artist and master bead-worker, Jennine Krauchi.

National Indigenous Peoples Day, also saw the historic introduction of the Métis Self-Government Implementation legislation. I want to congratulate and recognize the incredible work of Métis Nation of Alberta, Métis Nation-Saskatchewan, and Métis Nation of Ontario for this significant milestone which brings us one step closer to Riel's

vision for Métis across the Homeland.

The 21st was also an important day to celebrate past leadership of the Métis Nation. At an event held at Rideau Hall, the Governor General presented many incredible Indigenous people with the Order of Canada including, Métis leader John Morrisseau. As



past president of the Manitoba Métis Federation, John Morrisseau was the driving force behind a 1981 land claims suit brought against the provincial and federal governments,



which was upheld in 2013 by the Supreme Court of Canada. It was an honour to attend the investiture ceremony and celebrate John's contributions to the Métis Nation.

Additionally, this month, Canada released the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) Action Plan. The Métis National Council, along with its Governing Members worked collaboratively with Canada on Métis specific measures which have been incorporated into the Action Plan, along with approving several of the measures in the Action Plan common to Métis, Inuit, and First Nations, which contains commitments by Canada to achieve the objectives of UNDRIP which

Canada endorsed in 2016. We look forward to working with Canada and our Inuit and First Nations partners to ensure meaningful and timely implementation of the commitments made in the Action Plan.

Finally, our celebrations on National Indigenous Peoples Day included co-hosting, with Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami, an open house at the Indigenous Peoples Space in Ottawa at



100 Wellington to celebrate Métis and Inuit history and culture. Thank you to those in Ottawa who stopped by for a visit, including many Métis leaders and citizens who were in town to support the introduction of the Self-Government Legislation!


I am looking forward to the summer months and cannot wait to see everyone across the Homeland!

#### 2023 Back to Batoche Days Festival



# KOKUM'S KITCHEN RECIPES

#### Fry Bread

#### **Ingredients**

- 4 cups of all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon of salt
- 2 teaspoons of sugar
- 1 ½ cups of warm water
- 1 tablespoon of baking powder
- Oil for frying, preferably a neutral oil like canola

#### Directions

Place measured salt, sugar, baking powder, flour into the bowl and mix until combined. Add half of the water and begin mixing. Add remaining water slowly until "shaggy" ball forms. Knead the dough with your hands until it's not sticky but isn't dry.

Divide your dough into 12 pieces and

cover with a slightly damp towel. As the dough is resting, heat the oil in the pot or skillet: you need about 2-3 inches of oil (it may need to be adjusted if you are frying more bread).



Take one piece of dough at a time and roll into a 1/4 inch thin piece. Use a light dusting of flour to keep it from sticking to your counter or cutting board.

Once your oil is heated to about 350 F. (you can tell by if you hear a sizzle when you place the bread in), fry each piece until dark golden brown, then drain and dry on a paper towel. Be sure to not overlap your bread while cooking or they will not fry evenly!

**UNEP Global Peatlands Initiative, Québec City, Québec, June 11-15** 

MNC was invited to participate in a workshop hosted by the UNEP Global Peatlands Initiative in Quebec City on June 10th and 11th. Jessus Karst was part of a panel to talk about Advancing implementation of Multilateral Environmental Agreements (MEAs) through collaboration and synergies. The panel had members from different stakeholders and rights holders to discuss the importance of peatlands and how there can be synergies between the different groups to help conserve peatlands. The workshop was part of a larger international peatland conference focusing on restoration, reclaiming and rewilding peatlands that took place from June 11th to June 15th which MNC and MNS participated in. Peatlands are an important ecosystem for culturally relevant plants and animals to the Métis Nation, plays an important role in the water cycle, and are a crucial part in sequestering carbon. #### Target 3 Partnership Meeting, Cambridge, England, June 12-14

The Métis National Council travelled to the United Kingdom to meet with the United Nations to explore a partnership on implementing the new target to protect 30% of land and water by 2030. As a part of this meeting, MNC Conservation Policy Advisor

Kelsey Scarfone participated in a panel on the contributions of Indigenous Peoples. She shared the incredible work happening by the Métis Nation to protect land and water and the potential to do so further through consultation. We look forward to continuing these discussions and developing this partnership in the future!



# TRADITIONAL PLANTS CORNER

#### Shepherd's Purse

Shepherd's Purse is an annual herb, growing 10 to 60 centimeters tall with white, four-petal clusters of flowers. All parts of the Shepherd's Purse are edible and nutritious. Traditionally, the leaves and stems were steeped in hot water to make tea to provide relief for headaches, stomach cramps, hemorrhoids, and internal bleeding.













#### Canadian Medical Association Virtual Fireside Chat, June 12

On June 12th, President Caron participated in the last of three Fireside Chats held by the Canadian Medical Association (CMA). President Caron shared insight into the Métis experience within health care and the systemic discrimination that has taken place against the Métis Nation across the Homeland. At the Fireside Chat, CMA has committed to engagement sessions with Indigenous Peoples as they work toward the issuing of a formal apology as the national voice of physicians, for the harm caused to Indigenous Peoples in health care. This is an important step on the road to reconciliation and the MNC will continue to engage with the CMA as they navigate this process. 


#### National Indigenous Peoples Day, June 21

#### **Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival, June 21-25**


