Throughout our collective journey, I feel it is important to highlight the incredible work being done by our Métis Governments, our communities, families and volunteers. There is so much for us to celebrate and be proud of!

Two weeks ago, I brought greetings alongside the Federal Minister for Families, Children and Social Development at the Métis Nation-Saskatchewan's Conference on Early Learning and Childcare, titled "Guiding our children: Elders sharing their voice." Métis Elders have an incredibly important role to play building a bright,




prosperous future for the Métis Nation. Their guidance, knowledge, and love for our people has kept our culture and stories alive. The work being done by all our Métis Governments around Early Learning and Childcare is centring, honouring and uplifting our Elders to ensure Métis children have access to supportive and culturally grounded learning opportunities so that they too can contribute to building a strong Métis Nation for generations to come.

May 5th was the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ individuals. The Métis National Council will continue to advocate for lasting





Moments in History

May 9-15th, 1885: The Battle of Batoche was the final major action of the North-West Rebellion, which pitted the Canadian authorities against a force of Métis and First Nations people. The numbers and firepower of General Middleton's forces eventually overwhelmed the Métis fighters, led by Gabriel Dumont and Louis Riel.

The defeat of the defenders of Batoche and its capture led to the surrender of Louis Riel on May 15.


Citizen Spotlight


Métis Family Connections – Early Years was developed by Métis Nation British Columbia (MNBC) for families with Métis children birth to 8 years. The program is focused on helping families build a network of support that provides children with opportunities for early learning and childhood development. Métis Family Connections – Early Years Navigators assist families to access programs and services that are available in their region and connect them to community and culture. Since the program launched in April 2019, the program has surpassed 1000 enrollments in over 7 Regions across British Columbia. The Ministry





Métis culture and heritage. From daily entertainment to sporting events to Métis food vendors, there's plenty in store for the whole family.





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KOKUM'S KITCHEN RECIPES

Dandelion Syrup

Ingredients:

- 50 dandelion flower heads, untreated with chemical sprays
- 1 lemon
- 8 cups water
- 5 cups white sugar
- Makes 4 cups.

Instructions:

- Put dandelion flower heads in a large sauce pan.
- Squeeze in the juice out of the lemon and add water. Bring to a boil.

Cover and simmer for 1 hour.

- Remove from heat and let stand overnight, covered.
- Strain, return the liquid to a clean saucepan, and add white sugar.

Stir well and bring to a boil.

- Reduce heat and simmer for 1 1/2 hours or until it reaches the consistency of maple syrup.
- Store in sealed, sterile jars in the refrigerator. Serve over waffles or pancakes.

Our upcoming Effective Parent Advocacy Workshop on May 26, 2022 @ 7PM (eastern time) will cover how Métis parents can support and advocate for their children ages 0-12. During the workshop we will review:

- ∞ language used in report cards and assessments;
- ∞ questions to ask during parent/teachers interviews;
- ∞ and how to follow-up if you disagree with aspects of the assessment.

We will also discuss how report cards will differ if your child is on an IEP (Individual Education Plan).

MNC Updates

May 16th is the National Adaptation Strategy Symposium. The Symposium will launch public engagement on the development of Canada's first National Adaptation Strategy (NAS). Provincial, territorial, Indigenous, and private sector leaders will showcase adaptation efforts across the country, while NAS Advisory Table co-chairs will provide a high-level update on the work to date in the development of the Strategy, and set the stage for public engagement over the coming months. President Caron will be speaking on a panel at 11:35ET called "From a National Strategy to Local Action: Provincial, Territorial, Municipal and Indigenous Leadership and Strategies". Leaders will share their lived experiences on adaptation and highlight the important roles of provinces, territories, municipalities, Indigenous Peoples, and private sector through the development and implementation of adaptation initiatives in Canada, including the National Adaptation Strategy. Members of the Métis Nation Health Committee (MNHC) met in Alberta on April 26th & 27th to continue their discussions and planning as they move towards the development of a Métis Nation Health Data Development Strategy. The MNHC was attended by the Directors of Health of Métis Nation of Alberta (MNA), Metis Nation British Columbia (MNBC), Métis Nation of Ontario (MNO) Metis Nation Saskatchewan (MN-S), Les Femmes Michif Otipemisiwak (LFMO) and the Metis National Council (MNC). Each Governing Member was represented, which ultimately ensures that the entire Metis perspective was included in the Métis Nation health






agenda. The first day at MNA offices with a dialogue on Métis Health Priorities. The objective of this dialogue was to provide an opportunity to learn about the common health priorities identify for each Métis Governing Member (GMs).

From here, each of the GMs was able to discuss how the Métis National Council Action Plan moving forward.

The Committee was also able to discuss several issues including the role of MNC – Health Sector on identified health priorities, alignment with current national projects and Métis Nation Perspective about Non-Insured Health Benefits. Next Health Committee will be held in Saskatoon, SK at the beginning of June.
